

<u>Edgerton, Franklin.</u> TLS, Feb. 24, 1917, American Oriental Society, University of Penn, Philadelphia, PA. Promoting the mission and cause of the Society, VG. Linguist, scholar and noted Sanskrit translator.

<u>Kingsley, Mary St Leger.</u> who used the pseudonym Lucas Malet. TLS, Jan. 28, 1903, South Kensington, London. Following up on a request to sign "Sir Richard Camady", G+. Her work was of peer with Thomas Hardy, Henry James and

even outsold Kipling at the turn of the century.

<u>Parker, K. E..</u> ALS and TNS, 1902-03, Bateman's Burwash, Sussex, England. Rudyard Kiplings personal secretary advising of his unavailability due to travel, VG. Miss Parker, stole many of Kipling's personal papers, including two short stories after complaining he and his wife treated her "like a common typist" while expecting "work of quality".

<u>Pyle, Katherine</u>. ALS, Jul 27, 1933, Wilmington, DE. Sold a pen-and-ink drawing which Clark was seeking, Fine. American Artist, author and children's writer.

<u>Roberts, Sir Charles George Doulas Roberts.</u> ALS, Mar. 16, 1903, New York, NY. Ordering a copy of "Kindred of the Wild", F. Known as "The Father of Canadian Poetry".

<u>Welch, Charles.</u> ALS, Nov. 27, 1896, Office of the Art Amateur, Union Square, New York, NY. Promoting Bookseller of the Last Century" as well as himself as a scholar of children's books, G+. Noted biographer of John Newberry.

<u>Wendt, William</u>. ALS, July 16, 1935, Laguna Beach, CA. Thanking Clark for his donation to a mutual friend's wedding fund, a glamorous event which Clark was not able to attend, Fine. Prussian born, American artist known as "The Dean of Southern California Landscape Painters".

Bell, Nancy [N. D'Anvers; Mrs. Ar Othur Bell]. ALS, March 24, c. 1900. Bastgarth, Southbourne, Christchurch, UK. Request for a book, "Prehistoric America" which she is translating for the author, VG, with three book circulars. Bell wrote a diverse range of books from historical, art critique and novels.

Requested to review Prof. Richardson's "Comanche Barrier to South Plain Settlement", Fine, with cc: from Mississippi Historical Society. Oklahoma's premier historian, he held the chair of the Department of History at the University from 1924-42

<u>Phillips, Ulrich B.</u> ALS, Oct. 12, 1912, University of Michgan, Ann Arbor, MI. Requesting rights to a photo in one of his books to pass on to H. M. Henry at Vanderbilt University, VG. H3largely defined the field of the social and economic history of the antebellum American South and won the Justin Winsor Prize in 1n 1902 for his work, "Georgia and States Rights".



<u>James F. Rhodes.</u> Two ALS, Mar. 17, 1922, 392 Beacon St., Boston, MA. Declining to write an introduction to a work of John Hay, Fine. A wealthy industrialist, he retired early, moved to Boston and spent the rest of his life writing history books, including the 8 Volume History of America and won the second ever Pulitzer Prize for History in 1918.

Randall, J. G. TLS, Feb. 27, 1918, Roanoke College, Salem, VA. Responding to interest by Clark in publishing his book on Confiscation during the Civil War, VG. Winner of the 1956 Bancroft Prize, Randall was a Lincloln and Civil War scholar. His

work "The Civil War and Reconstruction" was a touchstone for many years. Prof. at the Univ. of Illinois.

<u>Smith, Justin H.</u> Four ALS 1918-19, University Club, Boston, MA. Seeking a publisher for his scholarly work on the war between the U.S. and Mexico, VG / Fine. An expert on the Mexican American War, Smith won the first Loubat Prize in 1923 and the Pulitzer Prize in 1920.

<u>Sioussat, St. George L.</u> Dec. 13, 1917, Brown University, RI. Receipt of Alvord's "The Mississippi Valley in British Politics" for review, VG. Eminent college professor at several universities was appointed by Archibald MacLeish at the Library of Congress to reorganize their manuscript inventory.

<u>Willoughby, W. W.</u> TLS, 3pp. Nov. 6, 1905, The Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore MD. Proposal for an encyclopedia of political science which he plans to write and edit, VG. Learned in his field, he was the first Director of the Brookings Institution and often wrote publications with his twin brother Westel.

<u>Wood, Edwin O.</u> TLS, Sep. 7 1917, Michigan Historical Commission, Flint, MI. Kind favor granting permission to reprint "Historic Mackinac", Fine. Chairman of the Michigan Democratic National Committee, he attended both the '12 and '16 Democratic National Primary and acceded to President of the Michigan Historical Society in 1916.

<u>Woody, Thomas</u>. TLS, May 21, 1928, University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, PA. Acknowledging Clark's willingness to consider his MSS for publication, VG. Also taught at Columbia, specialized in the field of education and sociological implications.





<u>Albion, Robert G.</u> ALS, Aug. 29, 1931, The Princeton Club of NY. Mailing MSS of the "Journal of Philip Vickers Fithian". Albion was Harvard's first professor of Oceanic History. referred to as the "Dean of American Maritime Historians"

<u>Barnes</u>, <u>B. A.</u> TNS, Dec. 19, 1904, White House, Washigton D. C. The President's acting secretary declines Mr. Clark's offer (likely for selling a book), Fine with envelope. Barnes who was secretary to both McKinley and Roosevelt, later was appointed to Postmaster General but fell under severe scrutiny for his heavy handedness in the Mrs. Minor Morris affair.

<u>Bartlett, E. L.</u> TLS, Mar 10, 1951, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C. Efforts being made to keep the Shields Library in tact at an appropriate Alaskan institution, Fine. First Senator from Alaska (along with Ernest Gruening).

Crowell, Benedict. Two TLS, June – Aug. 1920, War Department, Washington, D. C. Plans to publish a book on the U.S. Industrial mobilization of WW1, Fine. As Assistant Secretary of War, Crowell was very active in Ordnance logistics and became President of the NRA in 1930.



Howe, Frederick C. Five TLS, 1919-22, Conference on Democratic Control of the Railroads, Washington, D. C. An investor in the Clark Company, he was seeking his shares value and a discourse on the monetary system, with cc: from Clark's originals, VG. A Ohio politician at state and city level, Howe was an active monetary revisionist.

<u>Pomerene</u>, <u>Atlee</u>. TLS, July 2, 1921, Congress of the United States, Washington, D. C. Responding to Clark's comments about railroad taxes and the Tarriff Bill includes cc: of Clark's original, VG. Senator from Ohio for eleven years and appointed by

Coolidge to prosecute the Teapot Dome Scandal.

<u>Wing, George C.</u> Three ALS, 1916-20, Law Offices of, Cleveland, OH. Request to rebind lawbooks, and distribute books purchased, VG. Wing worked in Washington D. C. for the Department of Justice, the US Court of Claims, and the Department of State.

Woodin, William H. TNS, May 24, 1933. Washington D. C. Expressing no interest in the Cruikshank plates, Fine. An industrialist who served as the first Secretary of the Treasury under FDR.

As the third Archbishop of San Francisco, Hanna was an intellectual of the church and active in politics, labor mediation.

<u>Thwing, Charles F.</u> TLS, Dec 8, 1904, Western Reserve University Cleveland, OH. Sincere offer to provide assistance for one of Clark's undertakings, VG. Minister and President of Western Reserve from 1890-1921, a member of the National Negro Committee and supporter of the NAACP from its founding.



Wright, John, D.D., ALS, Apr. 17, 1896, Rector, St. Paul's Church, St. Paul MN. Sequel to his book "Early Bibles of America" entitled "Early Prayer Books of America" going to press, VG. Learned Egyptologist and author of at least six books, collected over 7,000 Bibles

<u>Young, Egerton R.</u> ALS, May 22, 1899, Torondo, CDA, on personal letterhead listing 5 of his books, G. He was a Methodist missionary, author and Indian advocate who helped resettle the Cree nation.

Includes a custom invitation in folded envelope and wax seal, to a private showing of his posters in his studio on Jan. 29, 1895. Five original, stamped, mailing envelopes included.

Content: Letters refer to the now very collectible: "Fringilla, or Tales in Verse. With Sundry Decorative Picturings" (1895) published by Burrows Brothers. Response to harsh letter from Clark, meticulous satisfaction with his work, status of plates sent to John Wilson, promoting himself with relationships to promote his book

William Henry Bradley (1868 – 1962) was an American Art Nouveau illustrator and artist. Nicknamed the "Dean of American Designers" by The Saturday Evening Post, he was the highest paid American artist of the early 20th century. He began work at 12 as an apprentice for a weekly. He held a variety of jobs in Chicago as a wood engraver and typographer before dedicating himself to freelance graphic design. His first solo venture, Wayside Press, Springfield, IL, gave him broad experience as an illustrator, typographer, editor, designer and press manager. He was a consultant for the American Type Founders and an editor for Collier's Weekly before going to work for William Randolph Hearst's film division as a supervising art director. In 1954 he won the AIGA medal, the highest honor for graphic designers. He continued as a prolific artist up until his death at age 94. \$150

Content: Devereaux wrote a small book titled "The Spirit of 76" which recounts the painting of historic scene by the same name completed by artist Archibald MacNeal Willard. These letters pertains to matters of publication, quantity, quality, and distribution of the book.

Henry Kelsey Devereux (1859 - 1932) was born into an aristocratic family on October 10, 1859 in Cleveland, Ohio. Ohio artist, Archibald Willard,

chose Harry to portray the drummer boy in one of America's most famous patriotic paintings, "The Spirit of '76". At the time Willard approached him to pose, young Harry was a cadet at Brooks Military Academy. Later he graduated from Yale and became a business person in his own right. He worked for the Cleveland, Columbus, Cincinnati & Indianapolis Railroad, and later managed the Chicago-Cleveland Roofing Co.He married socialite Mildred French in 1885 and in 1910 they settled in her father's pretentious country estate in Wickliffe, Ohio (presently Telshe Yeshiva College). His passion for harness racing and for breeding horses culminated in the organization of the American Association of Trotting Horse Breeders and his position as president of the Grand Circuit. Frederick Van Voorhies Holman (1852 – 1927) was a prominent lawyer and civic leader in Portland, Oregon. Legal counsel for the Portland Railway, Light and Power Company and other businesses, he was active

in Democratic Party politics and in civic organizations. President of the Oregon Historical Society from 1908-1927, he was known for his biography of John McLoughlin. A great admirer of roses, Holman

helped organize the Portland Rose Society and is credited with giving Portland one of its nicknames, "Rose City". A parcel of land once owned by Holman became Holman Park, which was later merged with other parks and parcels to form Portland's Forest Park in 1948, now the largest urban park in America.

In 1907 Holman published what is perhaps his most enduring work: "Dr. John McLoughlin the Father of Oregon" with the Arthur H. Clark Company. Very good. \$50

Rupert Hughes (1872 - 1956) was a prolific author who published more than 60 novels, as well as serious nonfiction. He considered his biggest achievement a three-part work on George Washington, published in 1926 - 29, yet never finished. He used original research from his vast library to show the human side of Washington. Hughes graduated from Western Reserve University in Cleveland in 1892, earned a master's degree from Yale University, and was a newspaper reporter in New York City when he was 21. He was the uncle of industrialist Howard Hughes, who learned how to make movies while visiting his Uncle Rupert. He only published one book with Clark, "Pitfalls of the Biographer" Very good. \$100

Louis John Rhead (1857 - 1926) was an English-born American artist, illustrator, author and angler. In the 1890s, Rhead became a prominent poster artist which appeared regularly in Harper's Bazaar, St. Nicolas, Century Magazine, Ladies Home Journal and others. In 1895 he won a Gold Medal for Best American Poster Design at the first International Poster Show in Boston. After the craze subsided, Rhead reinvented himself as a book illustrator for so many of the Classics. G + / VG. \$125

James A. Robertson (1873 - 1939) was an editor and Spanish linguist. Along with Emma Blair, he did editorial work on the 55 volume "The Philippine Islands, 1493-1803". In 1910 he moved to Manila and became bibliographer at their National Library. During his time in the Philippines, Robertson established library science as a discipline for instruction at the University of the Philippines. In 1918 Robertson was the founding editor of the Hispanic American Historical Review, and remained the journal's editor-inchief until his death. \$40

Oswald Garrison Villard (1872 – October 1, 1949) was an American journalist and editor of the New York Evening Post. He was a civil rights activist, a founding member of the NAACP. In 1913 he wrote to President Woodrow Wilson to protest his administration's racial segregation of federal offices in Washington, DC, a change from previous integrated conditions. Villard also was a founder of the

American Anti-Imperialist League, favoring independence for territories taken in the Spanish–American War. He provided a rare direct link between the anti-imperialism of the late 19th century and the conservative Old Right of the 1930s and 1940s. Near fine. \$50

Otto Schoenrich (1877-1977), graduated from Baltimore City College and received a law degree from the U. of Maryland. He served on the U. S. Government's Commission to Revise and Compile the Laws of Puerto Rico and later became an advisor to the Dominican Government's Minister of Finance. He served as President of the Pan-American Society of the U.S. Most of his legal career was with Curtis law firm, in which he played a minor role in revealing documents which affected the history of the Venezuelan crisis of 1895. A leading Christopher Columbus scholar, he published his book with Clark in 1950. Fine. \$100
