Elizabeth the Second. Signed Framed Appointment Document. London: February 10, 1953. Signed, "Elizabeth R". Queen Elizabeth the Second framed document dated 1953.

Measures 10.75 in. x 14.25 in. broadside size. Professionally framed and measures 17-in. x 20.5 in. total, not inspected out of the frame. The document is visible in full on a maroon matted background, recessed from the glass cover. Circular Royal Seal embossed along left margin. Attractive matching frame rimmed in raised gilt beads. Signatures also include the recipient, Alexander Forsyth, Second-Lieutenant and two additional, un-researched signatures ascribed to "By Her Majesty's Command". Not inspected outside of frame.

Elizabeth II (Elizabeth Alexandra Mary; b.1926) is Queen of the United Kingdom and 15 other Commonwealth realms. When her father died in 1952, Elizabeth – then 25 years old – became head of the Commonwealth. She has reigned as a constitutional monarch through major political changes, such as devolution in the United Kingdom, accession of the United Kingdom to the European Communities, Brexit, Canadian patriation, and the decolonization of Africa. Elizabeth is the longest-lived and longest-reigning British monarch, the longest-serving female head of state in world history. 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Philip, Duke of Edinburgh. Signed Page From Ship Maintenance Log; HMS Magpie. [n.p.]: July 7, 1951.

Signed "Philip" inside a red stamped block "Commanding Officer / 7 July 1951 / H. M. Magpie", in top right corner of the ship's log, approving ship repairs at the end of a week. Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh (1921 - 2021). husband and consort to the Queen of England, Elizabeth II. He commanded the HMS Magpie from Sept 2, 1950 until 1951, after which he retired from Navy. No place is identified, by likely while in port at Malta. Philip served in the Mediterranean during WWII and always showed enormous pride in his service to the Royal Navy. The Magpie, pennant number U82, was a Black-Swan class frigate launched in 1943 and was decommissioned in 1959. 6" x 8", 2pp., 8vo. Age fade, mostly at the edges, neatly excised, pre-printed page from what reads as the ship's maintenance logbook. Daily diary is written in blue script on both

sides of the page from July 4 - July 11. Some of the recordings include; "Tested navigation circuits...6th July REGATTA MARMARIS....replaced 4 1/2" supply fan in officer's galley...filling up with salt water during refill boarders." Likely signed while in port at Malta. Fine.

[Thomas Jefferson]. National Intelligencer; Vol XVI, No. 281. July 13, 1815.

Original copy of National Intelligencer dated bearing a signature "Tho. Jefferson" in upper right hand corner, likely written by a subscription clerk from the newspaper. The paper was the authoritative spokesman of the Executive during the Jefferson Administration (1801-1809), rapidly becoming the leading newspaper in the capital city. Jefferson continued to be a subscriber while at Monticello. He spent the summer of 1815 tending to the creation of his garden. Fragile and age toned, more so around the perimeter. Paper split at vertical fold professionally repaired.

The following description was offered by the staff at Monticello: "The handwriting on the front page would have been in the hand of the subscription clerk, and so would not have been in TJ's hand. I have come across examples of TJ's newspaper/periodical subscriptions with his name written in this way but very few survive, and certainly we have no idea where TJ's copies of the National Intelligencer ended up after TJ's death. They were likely offered up at the 1829 sale of TJ's library in Washington, D.C. and might have been acquired by a buyer and then dispersed thereafter. Neither can we rule out the other possible scenario that they might have been retained by the family after TJ's death in 1826, or else retained by Thomas Jefferson Randolph or Nicholas P. Trist after the 1829 sale of his library (if they were indeed offered at the sale and remained unsold), and then sold or dispersed by other means at some point". The records in the Library of Congress of the auction sale of the Jefferson library in 1829 listed as item #159 "National Intelligencer". Fair.

Nast, Thomas. A Modern Baalim And His Ass; First Appearance of Democratic Donkey in Cartoon. Harper's Weekly, January 15, 1870.

First Edition. 10.75" x 15.5", 1 pp. broadside of page from Harper's weekly. Horizontal and vertical fold showing some weakness, light chipping and small tears at perimeter, age fade, a few foxing spots, light shadow where once framed, 2" tape at top edge from previous mounting. Nast's depiction is the first time that a donkey is used as a symbol for the Democratic Party. The cartoon is also referred to as "A Live Jackass Kicking a Dead Lion". The jackass (donkey) is tagged "Copperhead Papers", referring to the Democratic-dominated newspapers of the South, and the dead lion represents the late Edwin McMasters Stanton,

President Lincoln's Secretary of State during the final three years of the Civil War. In the background is an eagle perched on a rock, representing the postwar federal domination in the South, and in the background is the U. S. Capitol.

Thomas Nast, came to the U.S. in 1840 when he was six. Nast intended the donkey to represent an anti-war faction with whom he disagreed, but the symbol caught the public's fancy and the cartoonist continued using it to indicate some Democratic editors and newspapers. Later, Nast used the donkey to portray what he called

"Caesarism" showing the alleged Democratic uneasiness over a possible third term for Ulysses S. Grant. In conjunction with this issue, Nast helped associate the elephant with the Republican party. Although the elephant had been connected with the Republican party in cartoons that appeared in 1860 and 1872, it was Nast's cartoon in 1874 published by Harper's Weekly that made the pachyderm stick as the Republican's symbol. Political cartoonists, as well as the parties themselves, have continued to anthropomorphize these two animals as their representatives. 
Photograph of the Washington Monument. February 1886.

7.5" x 5.68", sepia toned photograph mounted on a gilt edged board. The Washington Monument in script beneath the photo has a bit of ink smudge. The photo appears to be taken from the north, perhaps even the roof of the White House as the perspective is at or above tree top level. The Smithsonian Castle is visible to the left (southeast) of the monument.

This photo was likely taken upon the opening of the monument to the public. The Washington Monument was dedicated on a chilly February 21, 1885, one day before

George Washington's birthday. After the completion of the iron staircase in the monument's interior, the Washington Monument was first accessible to the public in 1886. The structure was completed in two phases of construction, one private (1848-1854) and one public (1876-1885). Built in the shape of an Egyptian obelisk, evoking the timelessness of ancient civilizations, the Washington Monument embodies the awe, respect, and gratitude the nation felt for its most essential Founding Father. When completed, the Washington Monument was the tallest building in the world at 555 feet. Very Good.

Rice, John C. Manuscript Civil War Letter. Poolesville, MD: Feb 8th, 1863.

5" x 8", 4 pp., folded lined correspondence written in pencil. Includes stamped mailing envelope to Miss Abbie Grafford, Springfield, VT. Eagle embossed in top right corner of stationary. Light aging at centerfold and tiny chip on edge of p. 3/4, not touching script. An endearing letter from a solider in the field with a prescient knowledge of the coming battles of summer, including his unit's critical role in the Battle of Gettysburg. The 13th, 14th, and 16th Regiments from Vermont formed the Third Brigade of the Third Division. The Division was led by MG Abner Doubleday (of the famed founder of baseball), while BG George J. Stannard led the soldiers from Vermont. Fine.

"Poolville MD Feb 8th, 63. Friend Abbie - I have just come off guard and I now find myself seated to write you a few lines your kind letter was read

Wednesday Feb 4th... I was on guard last Monday up to Head quarters of the Brigade came off Tuesday morn Wednesday I went on Camp guard and then went on again Saturday came off this morning after we came back to campe we had to go on inspection of arms & and I am so tired and sleepy I can hardly write there were three hundred more Caverly come here last Thrusday also there came the same day three hundred mounted riflemen this week there is 10 Regts coming here so there will be two Brigades here so I think if the Rebels come we shall be prepared for them... I exptect we shall see some pretty hard times next summer probable we shall go down to the front next summer... I believe the Jaffrey boys are all well as usual Edward Cutter has not been very well for a few days but is a little better to day I made a ring the other day & I am going to send it to you it is not a very good one it is the first one I have mad I do not have tools that I can make them with you can get Father to smothe it of and pollish it... I will close for this time I will try and write more next time excuse all mistakes write soon this this is truly yours in hast from John C. Rice" (sp as written) \$175

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Rosencrans, W. S., [William Strake]. Two Typed Letters Signed. Washington DC: September 1892.

Both letters signed "W. S. Rosencrans" on linen stationary. First letter dated Sept. 12 has (mite) holes along the right margin an edge, fade and shadow from being overlaid by another document. Second letter is near fine with only incidental edge aging and previous seller note in pencil. Both letters have three fold lines into six sections. Rosencrans is responding to an invitation to attend the Columbus Day Celebration in Slatington, PA.

William Strake Rosecrans, "Old Rosy" (1819 – 1898)

graduated from West Point Military Academy in 1842 and served in a series of engineering assignments through 1854 when he left the military and become a senior executive and inventor in the coal and oil industry. He was an outspoken and adversarial Major General with a rising star in the Union during the Civil War until his disastrous defeat at the Battle of Chickamauga in 1863 when he was relieved by U. S. Grant. In 1880 was elected to Congress, representing California. Very good.

"To avoid misunderstanding and incurring the reputation of being a youth altogether too promising, I write to say it is with much regret that I shall not be able to be present at your celebration. Very truly yours /s/W. S. Rosencrans \$175

Spoffard, Hiram. Manuscript Civil War Letter; Soldier from the Vermont Third Brigade. Fairfax, VA: Dec 28, 1862.

10" x 7.75", 4 pp., center fold with two mailing folds. Three pages have writing in pencil, legible and colloquial. While the envelope is no longer present, this letter is known to be from Hiram Spoffard to his siter, Abbie L. Spafford of Jaffrey, NH. Hiram Spafford (1841 - 1912) was born and died in Springfield, Vermont. He was the son of Hiram Spafford and Paulina Cutter. In 1867 he married Georgina Fowler and they had one child. Hiram was a corpsman in the brigade which later repulsed Pickett's Charge at Gettysburg. The 13th, 14th, and 16th

Regiments from Vermont formed the Third Brigade of the Third Division. The Division was led by MG Abner Doubleday (of the famed founder of baseball), while BG George J. Stannard led the soldiers from Vermont.

The Fairfax County Courthouse is the oldest historic building in Fairfax. The first land battle of the Civil War, the Battle of Fairfax Court House took place here on June 1, 1861, after a Union scouting party clashed with the local militia with neither side able to claim victory. A second battle took place here two years later on June 27, 1863, where Union troops were defeated. This battle delayed the movements of Confederate cavalry chief Jeb Stuart with disastrous consequences for Lee at Gettysburg a few days later. Very good.

"Camped Near Fairfax Court House Va / Dec 28 1862 / My Dear Sister I've yours of the 23d + was very glad to hear from you... It is sunday with us that is what you might call sunday but not like sundays in old Vermont... but there no sights to be seen there but old buildings with the windows broken out. There was some fighting at Dumfries yesterday we could hear the cannonading very plain it lasted for five hours we had orders to be redy to march at any moment but we didnt go if we had gone we should not got there in time to taken any part in it for we are thirty miles from there... Mother will think that I am getting sick of the war. Tell her there is others as wel as myself in fact all the old troops are. I have seen Euugne Bisbee... he look very thin... he said he had seen service enough + would like to get back home he has been out nineteen months. The box that you sent me on the 24th glad to get something from home the apples had been frozen but the rest of the stuff was good... you need not send any more paper to me for I bought some of Adin the other day enough to last me some time... the regmnt is coming + I must stop for this time I will else be bidding you good by / I am well From you brother Hiram Give my love to all." **\$150**

Cleveland, Frances F. Autograph Letter Signed (ALS) on Mourning Stationary; Addressed To Her Daughter, "Lovingly Mother" Ormond Beach, FL: February 27, 1916.

9.5" x 6.5", folded Mourning Stationary with a manuscript note on all four pages. Written in blue fountain pen, with a fold across the center, this also includes the postmarked mailing envelope with the former First Lady's franking signature across the top. An additional inclusion is a period post card of the Ormond Beach, FL hotel, from where the letter was written.

Esther Cleveland (1893 - 1980) was the second child of President Grover Cleveland and his wife Frances Cleveland

who is the youngest First Lady to have occupied the White House. Esther is the only child to have been born in the White House to a Presidential parent. The "Tom" referred to in the letter is likely Frances' second husband, Thomas Preston, who was an archaeology professor at Princeton. He and Frances were married in 1913, five years after the death of President Cleveland. Very Good.

Dix, John A. Official Pardoning Document. Albany, NY: July 15, 1873.

SIGNED "John A. Dix" as Governor of New York. 15" x 10", partially printed, manuscript document extending a pardon to two individuals. Includes State Seal of New York, aged and less brilliant than original, all teeth present on the perimeter, shadowed on opposite side of once folded document. Four fold lines, horizontal through the center and three vertical, reinforced on the rear. Lightly toned with a few tiny chips, mostly along right edge. Counter signed by N.Y. Secretary of State Anson S. Wood.

John Adams Dix (1798 – 1879) was Secretary of the Treasury, Governor of New York, Ambassador to France and Union major general during the Civil War. He was notable for arresting the pro-Southern Maryland

General Assembly, preventing that divided border state from seceding, and for arranging a system for prisoner exchange via the Dix–Hill Cartel. Dix was one of the first populist heroes of the Civil War, instructing forces to "shoot on sight" insurrectionists who may be trying to remove the American flag. At the beginning of the War, Dix was the senior most Major General of Volunteers. Good +.

PARDON FROM STATE PRISON: Whereas, At a Court held in and four our County of Kings in the month of April 1873 Isabella Donovan and Anges Primrose were convicted of Aiding Prisoners to Escape and were hereupon sentenced to be imprisoned in the Kings County Penitentiary at hard labor for one year...We have pardoned, remisde and released and by these presents DO PARDON.../s/ John A. Dix" \$250

[Gideon Tomlinson and William Ellsworth]. Manuscript Certified Vote Tabulation for Governor and U.S. Representative. Warren, CT:

1829 - 1833. Two items from the elections of 1829 and 1833 tabulating and certifying the city's votes for state and federal office. 7.75" x 13", folded 1 pp. docketed on the rear from April 6, 1829. Votes for the State slate of political leaders: Governor, Lt. Gov., Treasurer, Secty, for Congress, Senators. A total of 46 candidates are listed by name, with the winners of the Warren election also succeeding as state wide winners. Three horizontal mail folds, aging at the edges, small hole and edge tear on rear. The second document is 8" x 12.25", partially printed, certified election results from the election for

Representative of the people of this State. Fine with horizontal and vertical folds, several original ink smudges from corrections made, voting tabulation certified by Sherman Buckingham. All but one of the top vote getters in Warren won and went on to represent the state: William W. Ellsworth, Samuel A. Foote, Noyes Barber, Ebenezer Young and Samuel Tweedy. The next highest votes went to the unsuccessful candidate, Gideon Wells, who eventually went on to be Secretary of the Navy under President Abraham Lincoln. The entire slate of candidates politicked as being Anti-Jacksonian Federalists.

Gideon Tomlinson (1780 – 1854) was the 25th Governor for the state of Connecticut after having served in the House of Representatives, and subsequently as a Senator from the State. Tomlinson won the gubernatorial nomination in each year of 1827-1830, Tomlinson was elected Connecticut's 25th governor, with 53 of those votes coming from the Warren election. He was reelected to the governor's office in 1828, 1829, and 1830. During his tenure, prison reform was accomplished with the opening of a more civilized penitentiary. His administration advocated educational improvements and fiscal support to the public school system. In 1837, he left the Senate and became the first President of the newly chartered Housatonic Railroad Company.




Howe, Julia Ward. **Autograph Note Signed** (**ANS**); With Carte-de-visite. Boston, MA: January 11, 1894. 5" x 3", off-white postal. one-cent note card, canceled at Back Bay, Boston, accompanied by a Carte-de-visite portrait of Howe by "Warren's" of Boston, backmark. In this note she politely apologies for being unavailable for a previously scheduled appointment.

Julia Ward Howe (1819 - 1910) is perhaps best remembered as the author of the Battle Hymn of the Republic, which became the stirring hero anthem during the Civil War, as well as wrote the original 1870 pacifist Mother's Day Proclamation. Her real life's work revolved around the tireless promotion of Woman's Suffrage and Human Rights. At the time of this writing, Howe served as president for the second time of the Massachusetts Woman Suffrage Association. She was also president of the New England Woman

Suffrage Association, which she served until her death in 1910. Additionally, From 1893-98 she directed the General Federation of Women's Clubs, and headed the Massachusetts Federation of Women's Clubs. Fine.

Two mailing folds, otherwise an excellent document.Founded by Federal legislation in June 1861, The United States Sanitary Commission (USSC) was a private relief agency created to support sick and wounded soldiers of the United States Army (Federal / Northern / Union Army) during the American Civil War. It operated across the North, raised an estimated \$25 million in Civil War era revenue and in-kind contributions to support the cause, and enlisted thousands of volunteers. They supported hospitals, soldiers homes, physical rehabilation centers and other humanitarian efforts for wounded soldiers. Very fine.

"Dear Miss Washburn, It will give be great pleasure to renew my subscription to the Sanitary Commission for the year 1864 and if you will allow me to send you the amount in advance it will be a convenience to me. I accordingly enclose you



Hiram Stewart Jr. (1801 - 1861) was the husband of Frances Bounds and father of Hampton Sullivan Stewart (1829 - 1862). Hampton Stewart was born in Mississippi and served as a Private in Company A of the 21st Louisiana Infantry, Confederate States Army. The 21st Infantry Regiment was formed in January in 1862, and mustered into Confederate service in February. **\$750**

SS Orsova, a 1,503-passenger ocean liner, was built by Vickers Armstrong Shipbuilders Ltd. of Barrow-in-Furness, England, was launched on 14 May 1953 and entered service in 1954 for the Orient Steam Navigation Company for Great Britain-to-Australia services via the Suez Canal, the voyage taking four weeks. After 1955, the return trip was eastward via Auckland, Suva, Honolulu, Vancouver, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Panama, Trinidad and Cherbourg. In 1965–66, Orsova was transferred to the Orient Line's sister company, Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company (P&O), and operated as a P&O ship until retirement in 1974. Very good.



Europe: May 22nd - Aug 1st 1950. 60 pp of Manuscript journal in neat, clean, readable, printed looping font and 80 B&W photographs / postcards tipped or backed on mostly the verso of pages. The detailed journal of places visited, hotels stayed, people met, and journeys taken culminates with the arrival in Belgium to attend the wedding of the author's sister: Clarinda Garrison m. Andre Bouchart in Liege, Belgium, on July 22. Kean had only been recently married herself on March 22, 1950 to Hamilton F. Kean. This trip through Italy, Germany, Belgium and France was somewhat of a honeymoon

trip for the couple. As noted in the script, Ellen was feeling poorly one day and went to the doctor to determine if she might be pregnant. Alice Geraldine Farrar (1882 – 1967) was an American soprano opera singer and film actress, noted for her beauty and acting ability. She had a large following among young women, who were nicknamed "Gerry-flappers". Farrar made her debut at the New York Metropolitan Opera in Romeo et Juliette in 1906. She appeared in the first Met performance of Puccini's Madam Butterfly in 1907 and remained a member of the company until her retirement in 1922, singing 29 roles there in 672 performances. Farrar recorded extensively for the Victor Talking Machine Company and was often featured prominently in that firm's advertisements. Her personal life was of great interest to the public, including alleged affairs with

Arturo Toscanini, Enrico Caruso. In the year of this letter she received two (2) stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

Sir Francis Robinson (1910-1980) began his career in the theatre as an usher at the Ryman Auditorium while he was studying at Vanderbilt. After World War II, Robinson was hired by impresario Sol Hurok to help with the

Metropolitan Opera annual tours. Robinson's extraordinary gift for public relations led to the expansion of his duties at the Met to include head of the box office and subscriptions, and in 1954 he was made assistant manager of the company under the legendary Rudolf Bing. He went on to spend more than thirty years at the Metropolitan Opera. Fine.

The Stillwell Road (from Ledo, Assam, India to Kunming, Yunnan, China) was an overland connection between India and China, built during World War II to enable the Western Allies to deliver supplies to China and aid the war effort against Japan. Previously known as the Ledo Road, it was renamed the Stillwell Road, after General Joseph Stilwell of the U.S. Army, in early 1945 at the suggestion of Chiang Kai-shek. After the Japanese cut off

the Burma Road in 1942 an alternative was required to support the war logistics. Of the 1,072 mi. long road, 642 mi. are in Burma and 393 mi. in China with the remainder in India. After the British had been pushed back out of most of Burma by the Japanese, building this road became a priority for the United States. After Rangoon was captured by the Japanese and before the Ledo Road was finished, the majority of supplies to the Chinese had to be delivered via airlift over the eastern end of the Himalayan Mountains known as the Hump. Joaquin Alberto Vargas y Chávez (1896 – 1982) is perhaps the most noted illustrator and painter of the "Pin-up Girl" genre. Born in Peru with a photographer father, had the privilege to study in Geneva and London. The start of World War I forced Vargas to leave Europe, and he moved to NewYork. He was never formerly trained as a painter, and learned his airbrush techniques when he retouched photos in his father's studio in Peru. He was an artist autodidact, teaching himself how to use pen and ink, watercolors, oils, and pastels. Vargas was widely known for his use of the airbrush in his paintings. He did an underpainting with a paint brush first and, then, airbrushed color over top in a glazing

technique. During his time with Esquire Magazine, he relied upon the airbrush more and more due to the time constraints of his deadlines. His career hit a high-point when Playboy Magazine began publishing his works in 1959, which he continued to produce until the 1970s, when he went into a self-imposed retirement after the death of his wife/manager/muse Anna Mae. He produced 152 paintings for Playboy during that 16-year stint. He. After renewed interest in his works following retirement, and he produced a few more paintings, including the album cover the Cars' Candy-O album, and for Bernadette Peters (American Pin-up).

Serrano had received a grant of \$20,000 from the NEA. Senators Helms and a coterie of 36 senators expressed their outrage. Calls began for the cancellation of Robert Mapplethorpe's upcoming retrospective scheduled to open at Washington's Corcoran Gallery of Art. Helms quote about the works of both Mapplethorpe and Serrano are printed on the poster. Free speech suffered a set-back in that round of funding.

Pat Oliphant (b.1935) is a Pulitzer Prize-winning (self-effacing winner), described by the New York Times in 1990 as "the most influential editorial cartoonist" of his time. His career spanned more than sixty years, his work focusing primarily on American and global politics, culture, and corruption. Oliphant's caricatures of American presidents and other powerful leaders are world renowned. In addition to thousands of daily editorial cartoons, he also produced dozens of bronze sculptures as well as works on paper and paintings.

John Frohnmayer (b. 1942) navigated the NEA during a no-win era when conservative political factions sought to control the content and definition of art. Frohnmayer was a champion of art as free speech, yet was equally assailed by critics of the left for not going far enough.



War Correspondents. War Come To The U.S. -Dec. 7, 1941; The First 30 Hours As Reported to the Time-Life-Fortune New Bureau from the U.S. and Abroad. New York, NY: Time Life Fortune New Bureau, December 7, 1941.

This is a rear copy of historical journalism in the immediate, real time, aftermath of the Japanese bombing of Pearl Harbor. 8.5" x 11", approximately 100 un-numbered pages, double-spaced, blue carbon typed pages. Stamped "News Bureau Files" in red ink. Top edge of cover has been torn off, leaving a sun fade and watermark to top edge, a handful of light editing in pen, wraps are still attached though frayed at rusting stapes, otherwise the text pages are in fine condition. Limited censoring of the text, only to

individual names for protection. Brown, medium weight wraps with three staple biding.

The following pages are the reports made to News Bureau Chief David Hulburd in New York by his Bureau Offices and Correspondents during the first 30 hours after the Japanese attack. Reports which might aid the enemy on subjects such as the relative air strength of Japan and U.S., the extent of the damage at Pear Harbor, and U.S. military and naval strategy, have been deleted. In cases where officials made "not for attribution" statements their names have been blacked out. The TLF Bureau had 104 offices with full or part-time correspondents.

These dispatches are filled with reporting of historical significance: "Dec 7, 1:00 - Japan envoys asked appointment with Hull (Secty of State Cordell Hull)". Real time events evoke the unfolding of information to the nation: "5:14 p.m: Before he read a statement, the crowd heard the radio flash from Tokyo that the Japs had declared a state of war." As is a reporter's duty, poignant quotes were collected from notable personalities. Here is one from Sergeant Alvin Cullom York at his Tennessee Mountain home: "We got to put up a united front an give the folks a lickin' right away. We should take care of the Japs first and then take on the Germans." Reporters resorted to the folksy telling of personal tales: "Omahans who generally follow the midwestern custom of dining Sunday shortly after 1 o'clock" were mostly finishing dinner when the radio programs were interrupted to bring news of the bombing of Hawaii." Newspapers were printing Extras to get the news to their subscribers, "The Dallas Journal issued three extras, at 3:50, 5:09 and 8:07 and delivered a free paper to every regular subscriber. The Dallas News issued its first extra at 5:50 and sold 20,000 within fifty minutes." There are reports of vigilante justice: "Within less than two hours, Chief Police John Woods had rounded up and jailed 14 Japs in Norfolk, all known." As well, Military orders for immediate preparation are channeled through the press: "Brigadier General Rollin H. Tilton, commanding the Harbor Defense of Chesapeake Bay bulletined through WTAR that all officers and men were called to return to their posts." \$450

Exquisitely precise legal hand recounts in 45 lines the details of this Indenture of 600 pounds (approximately equal to 100K pounds at today's rate), in exchange for a parcel of land that includes multiple fields and meadows and buildings. On the rear of the document is witnessed by Susanna Thatcher and John Carey Junk, as well as six notations confirming annual payments

The introductory words, "*This Indenture*", in black include a printed or stamped symbol of the crown with the motto "Honi soit qui mal y pense", Middle French maxim, meaning "shamed be whoever thinks evil of it", and used as the motto of the British chivalric Order of the Garter. 16" (41cm) Vinyl transcription discs were played at 33 1/3 rpm. That format was standard from approximately 1930 to 1960 and physically distinguishes most transcriptions from records intended for home use, which were rarely more than 12 inches in diameter. A transcription disc is a special phonograph record intended for, or recorded from, a radio broadcast. Sometimes called a broadcast transcription or radio transcription or nicknamed a platter, it is also sometimes just referred to as an electrical transcription, usually abbreviated to E.T. among radio professionals. Included in this lot are such titles as: AFRS Sports Reel, "Words With Music", "Morning Melodies", Jack Berch and "G. I. Jive"

The War Department of the United States created a Morale Service Division in 1940. This department was re-designated as the Special Service Division (SSD). In October 1943, the

SSD was split into two sections. Athletic, entertainment and recreational activities retained the SSD name. Informational and educational activities became a new Morale Service Division. In November 1943, the SSD became Armed Forces Radio Service (AFRS). As early as January 1942, several agencies had started distribution of entertainment programs. American service personnel overseas were, at that time, limited to receiving only shortwave radiobroadcasts. During 1942 operations to record and assemble kits or packages of recordings for stations and bases were put in place, as well as overseas radio operations. AFRS and its forerunners produced their own programs with live audiences and the assistance of the radio networks. Most live audience programs were recorded at NBC Studio D or CBS Studio A in Hollywood, California. AFRS also had the cooperation of the networks in lifting original network programming and re-packaging it for distribution with the commercial content edited out.

The SSD was staffed with experienced radio and recording industry personnel, many of whom had been receiving draft notices and found the prospect of continuing their civilian work in uniform quite appealing, as

opposed to carrying a rifle. Starting from scratch, they grew the number of stations from 21 in January 1943 to 306 in December 1943. This included studio operations around the world, as well as Army mobile stations, which operated near the front lines in theatres of operation. AFRS was based in Los Angeles. Most wartime AFRS programs were produced in Hollywood, hence the "H" designation that AFRS gave to most of its programs. Additional shipping costs may be required. Fine. Very few are dated and signed, and if so, only by a first name, their once private words still protected by the anonymity of time. Also included is one letter dated 1871 and one typed poem. All pages are in Very Good condition, with all having mailing fold creases, a few with foxing, light edge and fold wear. The contemporaneous verse shows remarkably little editing. All poems are sufficiently sublime to be published. Titles include: "*The Sinner Invertation* (sp)", *"McAfee's*

Confesions (sp)", "*The Ocean Buriel* (sp)", "*The Dying Californian*", and the following refrain from the 120 line, rhyming, (abab) "*The Polish Boy*".

Lilian Whiting (October 3, 1847 – April 30, 1942) was an early female pioneer in field of American journalism. She served as newspaper editor-inchief (Boston Budget), column writer and author of poetry and short stories. Lilian was from a heralded lineage as a direct descendant of Cotton Mather on her mother's side and from Rev. William Whiting, the first Unitarian Minister in Massachusetts from her father's side.
