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

[Roosevelt, Theodore]. Dedication Exercises at the Unveiling Of Statue of Theodore Roosevelt. Portland, OR: Oregon Mail Advertising Corp., Nov 11, 1922.

13" x 9.5" unfolded, brown font on tan paper, uniquely folded with doors opening in the front. Inside is 9.5" x 4.5" black and white photo of TR as a Rough Rider upon his horse, folded across the middle. The statue was presented to the city of Portland by Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, a lifelong friend. Coe and Roosevelt met on the North Dakota plains in the 1880s when Coe was doctoring patients and Roosevelt was recuperating from the loss of his wife, decline of his health and a blistering loss of stature in the 1884 campaign. The bronze statue was designed by Alexander Proctor. Although President Warren Harding is identified on the program as being in attendance, it was actually Vice President Calvin Coolidge who attended the statue dedication in lieu of Harding. Fine minus a small wrinkle at one corner.





Full page insert at the front on pink paper advertising the prospectus of the book, chipped at top left corner. A quarter page insert, also on pink paper, explaining the book tipped in before title page. In the back of

the book are 6 pp. of lined paper for the "name / address / price" of those who were to be signed up to purchase this book, all blank, no names and orders are filled in. Some pages with fingerprints or smudge. Very good condition marred only by light wear at the corners, head and foot of spine and some dirt and spotting to the cover. Light spotting on a few pages.


Very good. Pictorial boards on red cloth with an outline of Africa on the cover and an illustration, highlighted in gilt and dark ink, of the quest of a lion. Gilt is present, though not as originally bright. Wear at the extremities, rubbed cover, streak on the spine.



7.25" x 5", pp. 3-125 with frontispiece of TR. Spine has three ~1/2" tear at top center and bottom of spine and one at top of front cover. Dog eared bottom edge and rear corners, with a small smudge on front and back. This small volume includes the first eleven editorials of Theodore Roosevelt, published in The Outlook from March 6th thru July 17th, 1909. The Outlook was a weekly magazine published in New York City under various similar names from 1870-1935. At the time of writing these pieces as a newly assigned Associate Editor of this popular magazine, Roosevelt was coming off of his term as president and gone to Africa on a scientific safari. 11" x 8.5", pp. 2-64 with biographies, photos, schedule of events, lists of committees and patrons, and a history of the presidency, inaugurations and the pageantry of the Capitol. It was at this, the first of FDR's record four inaugurations, that he advocated his eternal exhortation, "...the only thing we have to fear is...fear itself — nameless, unreasoning, unjustified terror which paralyzes needed efforts to convert retreat into advance." Fine with only light wrinkle to rear cover and 1/4" tear at top left corner. Stapled graphic cover by Newman S. Grant, Ulysses S. *Personal Memoirs of U.S. Grant*; (Two Volumes). New York: Charles L. Webster, 1885. First Edition.

5.75" x 9" 8vo. Vol. I frontispiece of Grant as a young 2LT (A. H. Ritchie Daguerreotype, 1843), pp. 8-584 with 2 facsimiles and 15 maps. Vol. II frontispiece of Grant as LTG (Wm. E. Marshall steel engraving), pp. 10-647 with 1 facsimile and 28 maps. Both volumes are in very good condition, still well bound, clean minus stamps, all facsimiles are fine and neatly folded in, all edges marbled. Both volumes have a stamp on blank ffe of "Chas. F. Branch / Physician and Surgeon / Coventry, VT. Vol. I has Branch's name written in ink on inside edge of rear cover, scuffing at edges and spine. Vol. II additionally has a stamp on ffe from Edward Little High School in Auburn, ME, scuffing and spotting similar to Vol I and 1/4" early separation at top of spine. All engravings with tissue page protection are also fine. Both facsimiles in place and in fine condition with the facsimile of Lee's surrender terms printed on yellow paper, just as the original was, with

two closed tears (~1") at the bottom from un-careful unfolding. The calf volumes are less common than the green cloth, all combine to make this an attractive addition to any presidential library shelf.

The story is often repeated of how a destitute Grant decided to care for his family by publishing these memoirs. He died five days after completing them and five months before Vol. I was published. His widowed wife, Julia Grant, received the largest royalty check of the 1800's.

The real story of this book is that of the original owner. Charles Franklin Branch (1845-1907) born in Newport VT, he was eager to participate in the stirring events of the times. He enlisted in Co. C., 9th Vt. Vols., and was successively promoted from private through the grades of Major. He attained this rank due to his conspicuous conduct at the capture of Richmond. In the early years of the war his regiment was captured at Harper's Ferry and paroled the next day. Branch was wounded twice during the war. Upon returning home after surrender, he became one of the leading physicians amongst his peers. His roles included the U.S. pension examiner for several years, also professor of state university for medicine and hygiene. He quickly rose to become surgeon-general of Vermont in 1886-'88. Branch was an esteemed leader for many civic and professional organizations as well as the medical examiner for nine prominent life insurance companies. His keen interest in education was manifest as the superintendent of schools in Coventry, VT for almost 20 years. Though he could have easily been elected to most any political office, he never showed an interest. Renown as a most brilliant speaker on the Civil War, he was always in demand as a Memorial Day orator. A hero in war and a hero in peace - Despite all of his accolade's, Branch's humility shows through in his name stamp, simply; Physician and Surgeon. G+ to VG in not issued dust jacket. Tan calf with a red label on spine for title and black label for volume with thin gilt bands, leather has been appropriately treated. Red marbled endpapers with Vol II having four small round spots of stripped card holder.

"General Lee was dressed in a full uniform which was entirely new, and was wearing a sword of considerable value, very likely the sword which had been presented by the State of Virginia; at all events, it was an entirely different sword from the one that would ordinarily be worn in the field. In my rough traveling suit, the uniform of a private with the straps of a lieutenant general, I must have contrasted very strangely with a man so handsomely dressed, six feet high and of faultless form. 


Hoover, Herbert. *The Ordeal Of Woodrow Wilson*. New York: McGraw-Hill, 1958. Special Presentation Edition.

SIGNED "Herbert Hoover" on tipped-in publisher's limitation page, Copy #65 of 500 numbered copies. 6" x 9", pp. xii, 1-318, with 12 pp. of B&W photographs, blued top edge. Wonderful copy of Hoover's last book, with no defects noted, has been protected by its issued slipcase. The slipcase is very good with fading to the exterior and rubs on the graphic front and spine which include Wilson in top-hat. Herbert Hoover

(1874-1964), was the 31st President of the U. S. During the Wilson administration he was Director of the U.S. Food Administration, bringing humanitarian relief to both sides of the conflict during and after WWI. From this perspective he had close, personal insight into Wilson and the first person authority to write this book. Fine in In very good slipcase dust jacket. Tan cloth over boards with titling in gilt on on blue panels on spine and authors signature impressed in gilt inside similar blue panel.

9.25" x 6.25", pp. xvii, 1-400, with uncut fore edge and gilt top edge, two volumes in slip case. The books are fine, the DJs are VG with each having some light chipping at the top and sunning to the spine, the slipcase is G+having done its job protecting the books. This book is from the Gloria Grace Griffen American West Collection at the Univ. of Nevada Reno as identified by attractive bookplate affixed to FE. Griffen was a historian of the Great Basin and professor / lecturer at multiple noted universities. She contributed five biographies and many well researched papers to the anthology of Western American history.

General of the Armies John Joseph "Black Jack" Pershing (1860-1948) served as the commander of the American Expeditionary Forces (AEF) on the Western Front in World War I, 1917-18, then continued on to Chief of Staff. Blue textured cloth over boards with titling in gilt on the spine and facsimile signature on cover.

Addressed to Kent Wall, President, Johnson and Murphy [Shoes]. Westmoreland was the Commander, U.S. Military in Vietnam from 1964-68, then serving as Chief of Staff, U.S. Army until his retirement in 1972. Fine with two mail folds.



MacArthur, Douglas. *Reminiscences*. New York: McGraw-Hill, 1964. Special Limited Edition, No. 413 of 1000 numbered copies.

6.5" x 9.13", pp. vii, 3-348 with a color frontispiece of MacArthur with hands on hips and jutting corn cob pipe, with 8 pp. of color photographs and 32 pp. of B&W photographs. SIGNED by Jean MacArthur on the limitation page, beneath a facsimile signature of Douglas MacArthur, as issued. Book is in VG condition, uncut fore edge papers, no visible internal defects, very light fade to spine. Slip case has a chip on fore edge and top layer peel on front of tan cardboard case.

Douglas MacArthur (Jan 26 1880 – Apr5, 1964) was an American five-star general, Field Marshal of the Philippine Army, and ground commander of the Korean War. He was Chief of Staff of the US Army during the 1930s and played a prominent role in the Pacific theater during World War II. He received the Medal of Honor for his service in the Philippines Campaign, which made him and his father Arthur MacArthur Jr., the first father and son to be awarded the medal. He was one of only five men ever to rise to the rank of General of the Army in the US Army, and the only man ever to become a field marshal in the Philippine Army. Very good. Brown buckram with titling in gilt on spine and 5-Star rank emblem impressed on front cover.

Rickenbacker, Edward V. *Rickenbacker*; *An Autobiography*. Englewood Cliffs, NJ: Prentice Hall, 1967.

First / First. SIGNED "Eddie Rickenbacker, 1967" in black fountain pen on ffe. 9" x 6", pp. 1-458 with 26 pp. of B&W photos. Book is near find with light rubbing to the corners and a small spot on fore edge. The DJ has some edge wear, mostly at spine ends, small chip at top of rear, while cover photo is still bright. Edward Vernon Rickenbacker (1890 – 1973) had an adventurous career as a race car driver, automotive designer, and pioneer in air transportation as head of Eastern Air Lines. His most notable accomplishment was as a WWI flying ace who received the Medal of Honor, had 26 aerial victories, and is considered the most decorated American for valor in the war. Very good in very good dust jacket. Quarter black cloth with bright blue cloth over boards and titling in gilt on the spine with author's initials "EVR" in purple on the cover.


Kennedy, Robert F. *To Seek a Newer World*. New York: Bantam , April 1968. First Paperback.

Signed, "Robert Kennedy" in his typically diminutive script on blank inside cover. 7" x 4.25", pp. xix, 1-235. The younger Kennedy's treatise on positions and politics in the run-up to the 1968 presidential primary. An early example of candidate position statements, in book form, which have become de riguer for contemporary challengers. Previous owner signature, who was a member of the Kennedy's Oregon campaign organization, is also on blank inside cover. Creased spine at front cover, tiny chip on bottom right, dog-ear at top right corner and light, consecutively minimal tide mark on corner of first 24 pp.

Includes a printed note of appreciation from Kennedy's widow, Ethel, sent to those who shared their sorrow in his passing. The note, on card stock, is trimmed in mourning black with a prayer card also trimmed,

Kennedy's engraved photo on the front and quotations on the verso. Includes original addressed envelope. Very good. Pictorial cardboard covers with RFK's photo on the front and back.





Strong, intentional signature by an extraordinary American business man, second generation politician and dynamic organizer. Mitt Romney, the son of an automotive executive, governor and presidential candidate, followed in his father's footsteps (George Romney) adding to his resume the successful management of the Olympics only months after the tragic 9/11 terrorist attack on the country. Near fine in Fine dust jacket. Blue paper of boards with titling

on spine in silver gilt.
