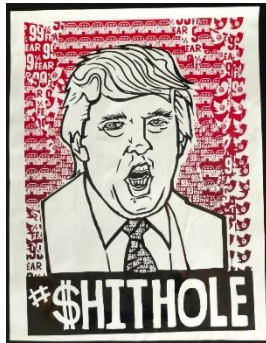

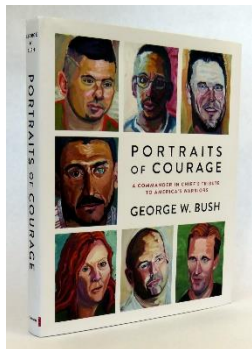
POSTER – BECAUSE HE HASN'T WRITTEN MANY BOOKS

As a result of the War on Terror which began under his administration more than 2.6 million service members have been deployed, more than 6,600 killed, more than 54,000 wounded and tens of thousands more left with emotional and psychological injuries. This has weighed heavily on the former president who dedicated the proceeds of this book to assisting post 9/11 Veterans. 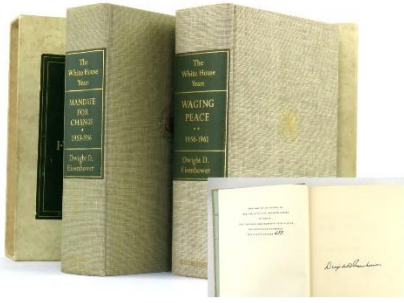

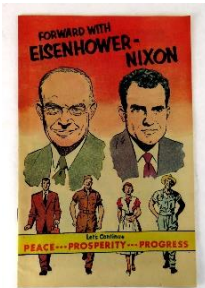

SIGNED BY TWO FOUNDING FATHER PRESIDENTS



Monroe, James and John Quincy Adams. Patent Signed as President and Secretary of State. Washington DC: May 20, 1822. James Monroe and John Quincy Adams Patent Signed as President and Secretary of State, respectively. Patent is partially-printed on vellum page, 11" x 14.5"; Washington, May 20, 1822. Blind embossed seal affixed at lower left. Documents are attached via two ribbons on the left margin. The patent, describing the assembly and functioning is hand written on one and half sides, witnessed by two additional signatures.

This patent is found in the U. S. patent records and is assigned the number 3,529X, Most of the patents prior to 1836 were lost in a December 1836 fire. Only 2,000 of the almost 10,000 documents were recovered. Little is known about this patent" The actual patent has now been discovered, yet a drawing is still elusive.

Highlight of this document is that it is signed by two U. S. Presidents and in full by the Secretary of State, commonly signed "J. Q. Adams". Also signed by William Wirt, longest serving Attorney General (1817 - 1829). Wirt was the prosecuting attorney against Aaron Burr in the treason trial of 1807. Fine. Toning and foxing around edges, darker toning on verso. Flattened vertical and horizontal folds. Boldly signed by both.

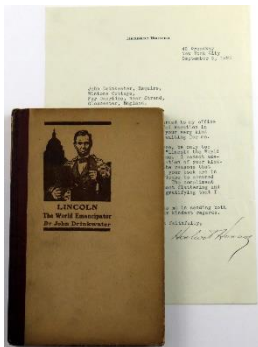

The future President graciously accepts Drinkwater's request to dedicate his new book, "Lincoln the World Emancipator", to Hoover. In 1920 Hoover was living in NYC after having failed early in a run for the Republican nomination. He endorsed Warren Harding, despite well founded misgivings, and was rewarded with an appointment as Secretary of Commerce. Excellent condition.

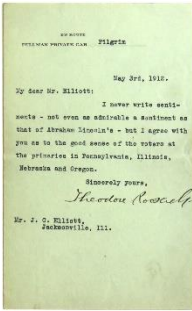

Cigar bands as a means of marketing and product differentiation extends back almost two centuries. At the turn of the 20th century it is estimated that about 4 out of 5 men smoked cigars. The advent of the color printing process ushered in the golden age of cigar bands between 1890 - 1920, of which these five are excellent examples of the printing skills and promotional intentions. A daily cigar was part of T.R.'s ritual, it is said that he started smoking them as young as eight to help with his severe asthma (go figure). I do wish that he greatly relished a Cubano atop Kettle Hill after inspiring and leading his Rough Riders to victory during the Spanish-American War (though he quit smoking as an adult). 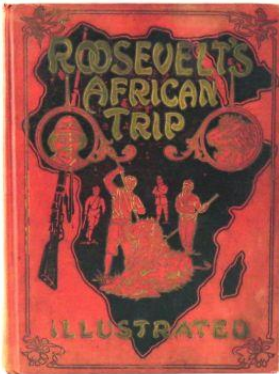
Roosevelt, Theodore. Typed Letter Signed. Theodore Roosevelt Typed Letter Signed. One page, on Pullman Private Car stationery, 5" x 7.8", [Maryland]; May 3, 1912. A to J.C. Elliott of Jacksonville, Illinois, concerning his recent victories in the 1912 Republican presidential primaries:

Former president Roosevelt wrote this letter to J.C. Elliott from his private Pullman car "Pilgrim", while on a two-day campaign swing through Maryland, giving speeches in such places as Salisbury, Havre de Grace, and Baltimore. Although William Howard Taft was his handpicked successor to the presidency, Roosevelt and his progressive allies had become disenchanted with Taft who was replacing many of Roosevelt's cabinet, and turn his back on the progressive agenda

Roosevelt decided to join the race against Taft for the Republican nomination in 1912, entering the primary contests. As he noted in this letter offered here, he was victorious in Pennsylvania, Illinois, Nebraska, and Oregon. He ended up winning nine of the twelve primaries while Taft only won one. Yet when the Republicans held their national convention in Chicago in June, Taft controlled the party machinery and received the nomination. Roosevelt was enraged and he and his supporters formed the Progressive Party (popularly known as the "Bull Moose" party), which chose the former president as its standard-bearer.

The 1912 presidential election was won by Democratic candidate Woodrow Wilson, with 42% of the popular and 435 electoral votes in a four-way race, which included Roosevelt and Taft. Roosevelt's popularity carried his Progressive Party into a second place finish, winning more votes than Taft and the Republicans. 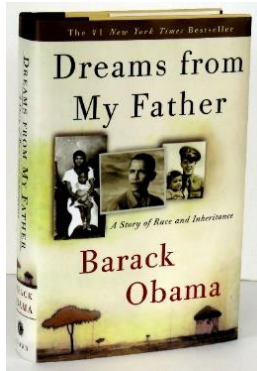

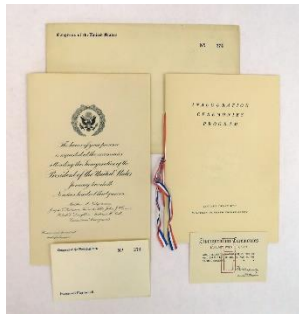

Barack Hussein Obama II (Aug 4, 1961) the 44th President of the United States from '09 to '17. Historically notable, the first African American to serve as president. Prior to his meteoric rise he only served three years in the U.S. Senate representing Illinois from '05 to '08 and in the Illinois Senate from '97 to '04. Perhaps his most significant legacy will be the "Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act" generally referred to as "Obama Care". Fine in fine dust jacket. 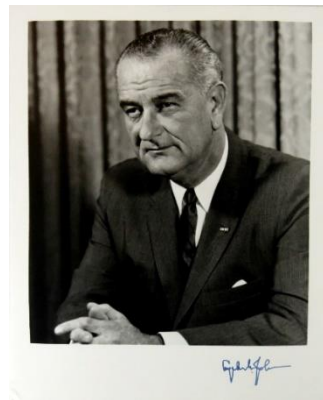

Hayes (1822-1893) was the nineteenth president of the United States. His presidency and the Compromise of 1877 effectively ended the Reconstruction Era that followed the Civil War. Matted and framed to the overall size of 7" x 10.5". Signature is bold, very light foxing. Engraving is very good.

Rutherford Birchard Hayes (Oct 4, 1822 – Jan 17, 1893) served as the 19th President of the United States from 1877 to 1881. He assumed the presidency at the end of the

Reconstruction Era. In office he ended Army support for Republican state governments in the South, promoted civil service reform, and attempted to reconcile the divisions left over from the Civil War and Reconstruction. Hayes, an attorney in Ohio, was city solicitor of Cincinnati from 1858 to 1861. When the Civil War began, he left a fledgling political career to join the Union Army as an officer. Hayes was wounded five times, most seriously at the Battle of South Mountain. He earned a reputation for bravery in combat and was promoted to the rank of brevet major general. After the war, he served in the Congress from 1865 to 1867 as a Republican. Hayes left Congress to run for Governor and was elected to two non-consecutive terms between '68 – '76.

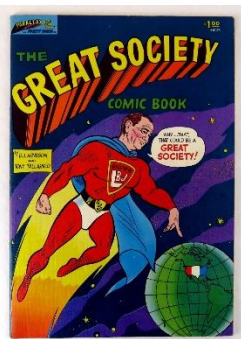

Lyndon Baines Johnson (Aug 27, 1908 – Jan 22, 1973), often referred to as LBJ, served as the 36th President of the United States from 1963 to 1969, assuming the office after serving as the 37th Vice President of the United States from 1961 to 1963. A Democrat from Texas, he also served in both house of Congress. Johnson is one of only four people who have served in all four federal elected positions. Born in a farmhouse in Stonewall, TX, Johnson was a high school teacher and a Congressional aide before winning election to the House in 1937.

He won election to the Senate in 1948, and was appointed Senate Majority Whip in 1951. He became the Senate Minority Leader in 1953 and the Majority Leader in 1955. Johnson became known for his domineering personality and the "Johnson treatment", his aggressive coercion of powerful politicians to advance legislation. Johnson ran for the Democratic nomination in the 1960 presidential election. Although unsuccessful, he accepted the invitation of the nominee, John F. Kennedy to be his running mate. They went on to win a close election over the Republican ticket of Richard Nixon and Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. On November 22, 1963, Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas, Texas, and Johnson succeeded him as president. The following year, Johnson won a landslide in 1964, defeating Senator Barry Goldwater of Arizona. In domestic policy, Johnson designed the "Great Society" legislation by expanding civil rights, public broadcasting, Medicare, Medicaid, aid to education, the arts, urban and rural development, public services, and his "War on Poverty". 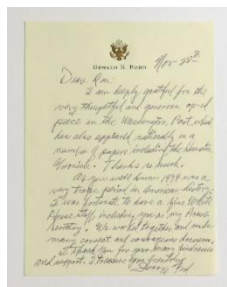

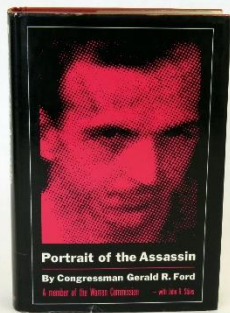
Ron Nessen had written a piece titled, "It Shouldn't Have to Be This Way; Remember the President Who Helped Us Rise Above Rancor", which discussed the 2000 Presidential Election and the ballot scandal that ensued. Ford, of course, had seen his own share of political scandal when he assumed the presidency after Richard Nixon resigned on Aug. 9, 1974.

Gerald Rudolph Ford Jr. (born Leslie Lynch King Jr.; Jul 14, 1913 – Dec 26, 2006) was the 38th President of the United States from Aug '74 to Jan '77, following the resignation of Richard Nixon. Prior to this he served eight months as the 40th Vice President of the United States, following the resignation of Spiro Agnew. He was the first person appointed to the vice presidency under the terms of the 25th Amendment, and consequently the only person to have served as both Vice President and President of the United States without being elected to executive office. Before his appointment to the vice presidency, Ford served 25 years as U.S. Representative from Michigan's 5th congressional district, the final nine of them as the House Minority Leader.

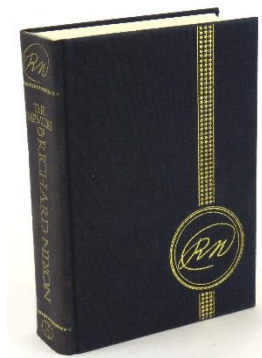

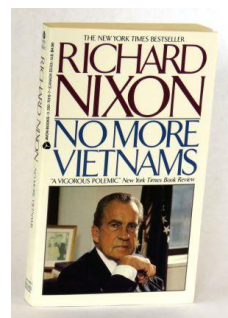

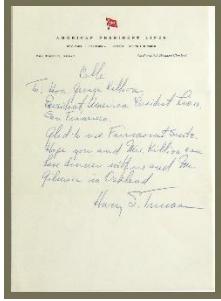

They arrived on March 29th as guests of businessman and oil executive Edwin Pauly onboard the SS President Cleveland. They returned to San Francisco via the same ship on May 5th.

George L. Killion (1901 -1983), had a reputation as a financial wizard who used his talent in many sectors, including government, industry and charitable groups. The jobs ranged from heading the March of Dimes in San Francisco to being chairman of the board of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer from 1957 to 1977. He worked as a fund-raiser in the campaigns of Presidents Roosevelt, Truman, Kennedy and Johnson. In '44 to '47, he was treasurer of the Democratic National Committee. In 1966, in the Johnson Administration, he was named an alternate representative to the United Nations with the rank of ambassador. In 1972, Mr. Killion was appointed a national vice chairman of Democrats for Richard M. Nixon. Fine, flattened mail folds.
