

The presence of Sandra Day O'Connor indicates an early 1980's date for this photo. The Burger Court marks the tenure of Warren E. Burger as Chief Justice of the United States. Chief Justice Burger replaced Earl Warren in 1969 and retired from the bench in 1986 (following the 1985 October Term). The Burger Court, in retrospect, was a period of transition from the more liberal Warren Court to the more conservative Rehnquist Court. The Court advanced privacy decisions to abortion via Roe v. Wade (1973). Other consequential decisions include: Upholding Miranda v. Arizona (source of the "Miranda warning"). It also ruled unanimously rejected President Nixon's claim of executive privilege, compelling him to turn the infamous "White House" tapes over to the Special Prosecutor investigating Watergate. Other landmark decisions: New York Times v. United States (1971) which allowed the Times and Post to publish the Pentagon Papers. Very good. Attractively mounted and framed.



Sandra Day O'Connor (b. 1930) served as the first female associate justice of the U. S. Supreme Court from 1981 to 2006. The first woman to ascend to the U.S. Supreme Court, Justice O'Connor brilliantly paved the way just as Jackie Robinson did for baseball. She was nominated by President Ronald Reagan and wrote opinions for some of the most monumental decision of her era including: Bush v. Gore, Planned Parenthood v. Casey, and Hamdi v. Rumsfeld. President Barack Obama awarded her the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2009.



Barack Hussein Obama II (Aug 4, 1961) was the 44th President of the United States from 2009 to 2017. Historically notable, he is the first African American to have served as president. The Great Communicator Appoints A Key Advisor

Small archive of documents relating to the career of Hon. Edward Bennet Williams on the President's Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board. From his Appointment Affidavits to the letter from President Ronald Reagan reorganizing him off the Board. The appointment document is signed by both Williams and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Warren E. Burger dated January 13, 1982. Also includes original mailing envelope and dinner placement card.

Edward Bennett Williams (1920 – 1988) was a high profile defense lawyer for the elite in the fields of sport, organized crime and governmental employees. He co-founded the Washington D. C. law firm of Williams & Connolly, to where this letter is addressed. Williams also owned two professional sports teams: the Baltimore Orioles and the Washington Redskins. He was well known throughout the upper echelons for how much he knew about the dark side of the law. It was highly suspected that he was Deep Throat of Nixon's Watergate Scandal.

The President's Intelligence Advisory Board (PIAB) is an advisor to the Executive Office. According to its self-description, it "provides advice to the President concerning the quality and adequacy of intelligence collection, of analysis and estimates, of counterintelligence, and of other intelligence activities." It was founded by President Eisenhower and has continued uninterrupted except for Jimmy Carter's tenure. When Reagan re-instituted the Board, Williams was among its first new members. 

One of those names, Roosevelt Grier, was also with him at the time of the assassination; as well as pamphlets, envelopes, door hangers, rally poster, and fact

sheets. All items are in fine condition, with only the position paper having some toning at the perimeter.

This being the city where he was assassinated following his win of the California and South Dakota primaries on June 4th. As Kennedy was leaving the celebration at the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles following the win, he went through the hotel kitchen where he was shot and killed. Luke O'Neill was convicted of first degree murder for strangling a 24 year old crippled girl outside her apartment in 1922. He then went on the lam, and finally captured six years later. Previously, O'Neill had served in the army overseas during World War I where he had been wounded and gassed. This service likely influenced FDR to make this merciful decision on O'Neill's planned day of execution. Fine.





Cernan traveled into space three times and to the Moon twice: as pilot of Gemini 9A in June 1966, as lunar module pilot of Apollo 10 in May 1969, and as commander of Apollo 17 in December 1972. 

Grace Goodhue Coolidge (1879 – 1957) was the wife of the 30th President of the United States, Calvin Coolidge. She was the First Lady from 1923 to 1929. After graduating from the University of Vermont in with a bachelor of arts degree in teaching and joined the Clarke Schools for Hearing and Speech in Northampton, Massachusetts to teach deaf children to communicate by lip reading, rather than by

signing. As her husband advanced his political career, Grace avoided politics. When Calvin Coolidge was elected Governor of Massachusetts in 1919, she remained at home in Northampton with their children. After her husband's death in 1933, she continued her work with the deaf and wrote for several magazines. Very good +.





Millard Fillmore (1800 - 1874) was the 13th President. Everett's oration occurred during the 1856 presidential year when Fillmore, who had succeeded to the presidency in 1850 upon the death of Zachary Taylor and served until 1853, was running for that office on the American, or Know-Nothing ticket. Everett espouses at length, as was his public persona known to do, on the early history of Albany, the progress of the Science of Astronomy and its study in 18th century America, the public's contributions to Astronomy in the form of Observatories and education, and the progress of science and useful arts in America. This

title, of which there are many of Everett's others, does not appear in Sabin or Decker's bibliography. Very good. Brown paper wraps.



Hamilton Fish (1808 - 1893) was a native New Yorker who graduated from Columbia, became a lawyer and entered politics as a Whig. He was elected to congress in 1842 and wrote this letter during his term. President John Tyler, elected Vice President on the Whig ticket head by President William Henry Harrison in 1840, became the first accidental President after Harrison's death in 1841. Tyler and his erstwhile Whig colleagues became bitter opponents when the new President thwarted the Whig legislative program. Clearly Fish was correct in concluding he could be of no help to his constituent Shankland, whatever the nature of Shankland's request.

Thomas Shankland was also a New York lawyer. The 1845 New York State Register lists him as a "Commissioner to take Acknowledgments and Depositions for the different States and Territories, residing in the city of New York". Shankland was nominated by President Lincoln as Consul at Port Louis, France, in December, 1861. Very good.

"I have the satisfaction to acknowledge the receipt of your esteemed favor of 9th inst. the relations subsisting between the executive & the political party with which I am connected, is such as to prevent my recommendations to him carrying any weight - in truth, I do not feel justified in endeavoring to approach him upon the matter which you request in your letter. You will perceive the peculiarity of my position in this respect & will I am sure appreciate the motives which compel me, in all such cases to abstain from the attempt to exercise an influence which I am assured would be entirely unsuccessful even if it were not to prove injurious to the applications in whose behalf it might be exerted. / With the highest respect I have the honor - Your Obed. 

Light fade at edges, several small foxing spots, two mailing folds, otherwise a very collectible, clean letter from the man whose presidency lasted barely six months. At the time of this letter, he had been a Representative for Ohio's 19th District for more than 15 years and was only 3 years away from his inauguration.

James Abram Garfield (1831 – 1881) was the 20th President of the United States, serving from March 4, 1881, until his assassination by the anarchist Charles J. Guiteau only four months later. Garfield survived the gunshot another for two more months where upon he was succeeded by his Vice President Chester Arthur. Garfield had been elected to the Senate before his candidacy for the White House, though he declined the Senate seat once he was elected President. During the Civil War he opposed Confederate secession and served as a major general and fought in the battles of Middle Creek, Shiloh and Chickamauga. He was first elected to Congress in 1862 and served nine terms in the House of Representatives.





In the 19th century, the Port of New York was the primary port of entry for goods reaching the United States, and as such the Custom House in New York at one point collected almost 75% of the custom revenue in the country. The amount of money passing through the Custom House made working there a prime position, and corruption was widespread. Until the civil service reforms of the late nineteenth

century, all Custom House employees were political appointees. The President appointed the four principal officers: Collector of Customs, Naval Officer, Surveyor of Customs, and Appraiser of Customs. The Customs House patronage was the subject of great debate during the Rutherford B. One Collector of Customs, Chester A. Arthur (1871–1878), later became President of the United States. Arthur was said to have made several times more income as a collector than he did as a lawyer. 




Albert Horton Foote Jr. (1916 - 2009) was a playwright and screenwriter, perhaps best known for his screenplay of this novel, which was adapted to the 1962 film by the same name, and his original screenplay for the film Tender Mercies (1983), both of which won him an Academy Award. He was also known for his writing of notable live television dramas during the Golden Age of Television.

Nelle Harper Lee (1926 – 2016) won the 1961 Pulitzer Prize for this book which has become a classic of modern American literature. Lee received numerous accolades and honorary degrees, including the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2007, which was awarded for her contribution to literature. She assisted her close friend Truman Capote in his research for the book In Cold Blood (1966). Capote was the basis for the character Dill Harris in this book. Lee was actively involved with the adaptation of the book to the 1962 Academy Award—winning screenplay and certainly worked closely with Foote on the project. She was laudatory in her praise and approved of the result: "I think it is one of the best translations of a book to film ever made."



McCain followed his father and grandfather, both four-star admirals, into the United States Navy, graduating from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1958 at the bottom of his class. In October 1967, while on a bombing mission over Hanoi, he was shot down, seriously injured, and captured by the North Vietnamese. He was a prisoner of war until 1973. McCain experienced episodes of torture, and

refused an out-of-sequence early repatriation offer. He was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1982, McCain served two terms. He was first elected to the U.S. Senate in 1986, winning re-election easily five times, most recently in 2016. McCain secured the Republican nomination for President in 2008 but was defeated by Democratic candidate Barack Obama in the general election. Fine in fine dust jacket. 

Previous owner was Solomon Barkin, a labor economist and professor at the University of Massachusetts who wrote prodigiously about working people. Barkin spent 25 years in the labor movement, as director of research for the Textile Workers Union. His first book in 1930 was a study of old-age security, surely to have gotten FDR's attention. Other signers include: John J. Raskob,

builder of the Empire State Building, Carroll H. Sudler; First Director of the National Housing Administration; Hampton Robb, son of early nursing pioneer Isabel Hampton Robb; Henry P. Kendall, Chairman of The Business

Council, then known as Business Advisory Council for the United States Department of Commerce; Elwood Mead, known for heading the United States Bureau of Reclamation; E. L. Fries who held various positions in the NRA.

Charles Lambert Heyniger was founder and Headmaster of the Darrow School in Mt. Lebanon, NY, the only school founded on a Shaker Historic site. The NRA was established to administer provisions of Title I of the National Industrial Recovery Act (NIRA) of 1933. Initially, NRA promoted rehabilitation of industry and trade in the United States, expansion of employment, and improvement of labor conditions. Good + in not present dust jacket. 

Richard Michael Fraser, Baron Fraser of Kilmorack, CBE (1915 – 1996) After WWII, Fraser joined the Conservative Research Department (CRD), serving as its Director between 1959 and 1964 and was Deputy Chairman of the Conservative Party between 1964 and 1975. He was described as a "linchpin" between the variously wings of the Conservative Party while he was its Deputy Chairman.

Sir Edward Richard George "Ted" Heath KG MBE (1916-2005) served as Prime Minister of the United Kingdom from 1970 to 1974 and Leader of the Conservative Party from 1965 to 1975. Heath also served for 51 years as a Member of Parliament. After the Conservative Party lost the general election of 1964, the defeated Home changed the party leadership rules to allow for a ballot by MPs. The following year, Heath—who was Shadow Chancellor at the time, and had recently won favorable publicity for leading the fight against Labour's Finance Bill. Heath became the Conservatives' youngest leader and retained office following the party's defeat in the general election of 1966, to which the inscription refers. Very good + in VG+ dust jacket. Postmaster. His party loyalty and organizational skills were recognized in his appointment to Chairman of the Republican National Committee. William J. Lachner, (b. 1869) earned his law degree from Univ. of Michigan, practiced law in eastern Oregon and was the proprietor of the *Baker City Herald* prior to this appointment. He was a stalwart Republican loyalist throughout his career and life.
